Who writes like... Agatha Christie

According to the Guinness Book of Records, **Agatha Christie** is the best selling fiction author of all time, with over two billion copies of her work sold. Her books are popular world-wide and have been translated into more than forty-five foreign languages.

She was born in Torquay in 1890, and married her first husband in 1914, but divorced him in 1928. In 1930 on a visit to Baghdad she met Max Mallowan, an archaeologist, who she later married. For over thirty years she accompanied him on his digs, and became one of the most informed women in the archaeological field.

In all her books she wrote about the world she knew, drawing on her experiences and observations in England, and whilst travelling, for her plots, locations and characters. She herself said that whilst her characters were fictitious, her settings were always real. Her two main protagonists are household names. Her first book featured Hercule Poirot, the Belgian detective, whose 'little grey cells' always ensure that he triumphs over devious criminals, and he managed to appear in over thirty novels. Her other famous sleuth, the shrewdly inquisitive Miss Jane Marple of St. Mary Mead, appeared in twelve novels.

In the interwar years Agatha Christie was one of several authors writing novels in a certain style that has come to be described as the Golden Age of English Crime Writing. These writers shared the conventions and snobberies of the day, and usually have the crime taking place in a 'closed' group of influential people. Although many novels are set in the 1930s, the Depression has little impact, and working-class people do not exist, unless as humble and loyal servants and tradesmen.

Agatha Christie's books are very popular with members of Calibre and we have over thirty titles in the library including:

Dorothy L Sayers is another writer from this Golden Age. Born in 1893 in Oxford, she was raised in Huntingdonshire and educated by a French Governess until she was sent to boarding school in her teens. She won a scholarship to Oxford University where she obtained a First Class Honours Degree, and she is often credited with being the most intelligent of all the Golden Age authors. Her plots are ingenious and intricate and she uses technical detail with great skill, especially her faultless descriptions of motorbikes – riding motorcycles was a passion of hers.

Her personal life was turbulent and unhappy, and it is frequently said that when she created her main character, Lord Peter Wimsey, she was in fact giving him the characteristics of her perfect man, an intelligent partner and passionate lover! When she gradually introduced Harriet Vane into her books it is generally believed the Harriet was Dorothy's alter ego. In 1948 she announced that she would write no further 'Wimsey' novels, but she did relent as the couple appear in some short stories. On her death an unfinished 'Wimsey' manuscript, 'Thrones, Dominations', was discovered and it was completed, many years later by Jill Paton Walsh.

From this time she concentrated on her more academic writings, and she is remembered for her skilled translations of medieval French and Italian works.

Like Agatha Christie she also wrote several stage and radio plays. We have a selection of her detective stories in the library, including

Ngaio Marsh is another writer from the Golden Age. She is considered an exponent of the English mystery novel, even though she was actually born in New Zealand in 1895. Initially she trained as an artist and was very successful. She then developed a life-long passion for theatre, where she worked as a writer, director and producer. Writing novels was almost a third career for her.

She first visited England in 1928, and was to move between England and New Zealand for most of her life. She created Detective Inspector Roderick Alleyn, who with his wife, Troy, solves the crimes of the upper classes. She did in fact set four of the Alleyn novels in New Zealand, although they are still written in the style of the English Mystery. Here are a selection of novels by Ngaio Marsh that have been recorded for Calibre.

Another writer from this era is **Margery Allingham**, born in Ealing in 1904. Allingham's parents and aunt were all writers, journalists, editors and publishers. She earned her first fees when she was eight when her aunt published one of her stories, and she continued to write stories and plays throughout her schooldays. At college she studied speech and drama, and continued writing plays as she had at school.

Her first mystery was an essay published in The Daily Express. Early in her novels she introduces her protagonist, Detective Albert Campion, an aristocratic 'silly ass'. Over the next forty years Campion matures into an intelligent, veteran investigator. She also introduces and develops the characters of Campion's sidekicks, Lugg, a reformed cat-burglar who is now his manservant, and Stanislaus Oates, the ever dependable policeman. Elizabeth Ferrars and **Patricia Wentworth** were also prolific crime writers of this period, and both were born in parts of the British Empire. **Elizabeth Ferrars** was born in 1907 in Rangoon, Burma. With over seventy crime novels to her credit she was a founder member of the Crime Writers' Association. Her main character is amateur detective Toby Dyke. Suggestions for her books are:

The Home Front

Unlike earlier international conflicts the Second World War had an enormous impact on the everyday lives of all civilians. Much of what has been written about the war, fiction and non-fiction, has concentrated on politics and diplomacy; military campaigns on land, sea and air; fighting and bravery in action; prisoners of war and their suffering; espionage and counter-espionage, etc. Rather less has been written portraying the lives of the civilians left behind.

We know there were hardships and shortages of all kinds to be endured. With many men away at war, women had to take on jobs they had never tackled before. For the first time civilians were personally exposed to the devastation, death and injury of war as a result of German bombing campaigns.

I am a child of the 1950s and only know about this from my parents and grandparents, but I am sure that many of you will be only too familiar with life on the Home Front. For some of you these books will recall familiar times, but for others, like myself, they will be an education. I have also included fiction set in this period for your entertainment. Whilst I was looking for material on 1939-1945, I have found one book that I had to include on civilian life in The Great War.
